PREPARATORY PRAYERS

Please use the time before the Eucharist begins for careful devotional preparation. The following prayers may be helpful.

O Saviour of the world, who by Thy Cross and precious Blood hast redeemed us, save us and help us, we humbly beseech Thee, O Lord.

Jesus, by your closing eyes, look on my sin no more:
Jesus, by your broken heart, fill mine with love for you.

The Order of Eucharist

Introductory Rite

In the name of the † Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen

The Lord be with you

or

Grace mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you

And also with you

Penitential Rite

The priest (or deacon) invites the people to confess their sins; After a brief silence all say:

Most merciful God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed.

We have not loved you with our whole heart.

We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves.

In your mercy forgive what we have been,

help us to amend what we are, and direct what we shall be; that we may do justly, love mercy,

and walk humbly with thee, our God. Amen

Or we use the responsorial Kyrie

The priest tells us we are forgiven an all respond **Amen.**

The Collect

The priest invites us to pray using the special prayer for today on the sheet and then after the opening prayer we all respond **Amen**

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

Sermon



The Creed (said on Sundays and Holy Days)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made.

(All bow)

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead.

and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen

The prayers above may be said quietly by the priest if a hymn is sung

Pray my brothers and sisters that this my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the Almighty Father

May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and Glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his Church

The priest says the Prayer over the gifts after which all reply

The Eucharistic Prayer

The Lord be with you and also with you.
Lift up your hearts.
We lift them to the Lord.
Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
It is right to give thanks and praise.

The priest praises God for his mighty acts and all respond

Holy, holy, holy Lord
God of power and might,
Heaven and earth are full of your glory
Hosanna in the highest
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord
Hosanna in the highest.

The priest recalls the Last Supper

One of these four acclamations is used

[Great is the mystery of faith:]

Christ has died:

Christ is risen:

Christ will come again.

[Praise to you, Lord Jesus:]

All Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our

life:

Lord Jesus, come in glory

[Jesus Christ is Lord:]

All Lord, by your cross and

resurrection

you have set us free.

You are the Saviour of the

world

[Christ is the bread of life:]

All When we eat this bread

and drink this cup,

we proclaim your death, Lord

Jesus, until you come in glory.

The Prayer continues and leads into the doxology, to which All respond boldly

Amen.

Or if Eucharistic prayer A or G is used

Blessing and honour and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. Amen.

hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come thy will be done,

the power and the glory,
for ever and ever. Amen.

Breaking of the Bread

The priest breaks the consecrated bread.

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

Act of Spiritual Communion

You are invited to make your spiritual communion

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen

Prayer after Communion

The priest says the prayer after communion and all reply **Amen**

Almighty God, we or thank you for feeding us with the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ.

Through him we offer you our souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice. Send us out in the power of your Spirit to live and work to your praise and glory.

Amen.

Father of all, we give you thanks and praise, that when we were still far off you met us in your Son and brought us home. Dying and living, he declared your love, gave us grace, and opened the gate of glory. May we who share Christ's body live his risen life;

we who drink his cup bring life to others; we whom the Spirit lights give light to the world.

Keep us firm in the hope you have set before us, so we and all your children shall be free, and the whole earth live to praise your name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.
